

In this fast-paced city, people are often preoccupied. Amongst such a constant buzz of activity, we may sometimes overlook changes taking place in our environment. With the arrival of autumn, there comes a dramatic transformation of scenery. The falling leaves that spread over the streets and rivers seem to imply an end of life. Rarely appreciating the significance of forms taken by things when dead or losing vitality, it is ironic that we take an interest in the fallen leaves.

Observing insignificant things can reveal the unexpected. Beauty can be found in the fallen dead leaves, the pattern of veins on each leaf bearing a distinctly different outline and individuality reminiscent of the lines on a human palm. Variations in appearance can also be witnessed depending on the age of the leaf or effects caused by illness. The veins, colors and forms of a leaf embody life. Once that life comes to an end, it remains as a subtle memory while we await the arrival of new life in spring.

このペースの速い都市では、人々はしばしば気が取られている。そのようなざわめきの中、 我々は時々環境で起きている変化を見逃すことがある。秋が訪れると、景色はドラマチックな変化を遂げる。道路や河川に広がる落ち葉を観察すると、生の終わりを思い浮かばせる。死に至ったもの、活力を失ったものが姿を変えると認識しないことの多い我々が、落ち葉を美しく感じ取ることは皮肉のようである。

些細なことを観察すると、予期しないことを発見することもある。落ち葉には美しさも感じ取れ、それらに現れる葉脈の模様は異なるアウトラインと個性をもち、人間の手のひらの線を思い起こさせる。また、その葉の重ねた年や病気によって起こる変化も見事である。葉脈、色、形といったものが命の象徴である。その命が終わる時、春の新生の到着を待っている我々にとって、些細な記憶として残る。
